

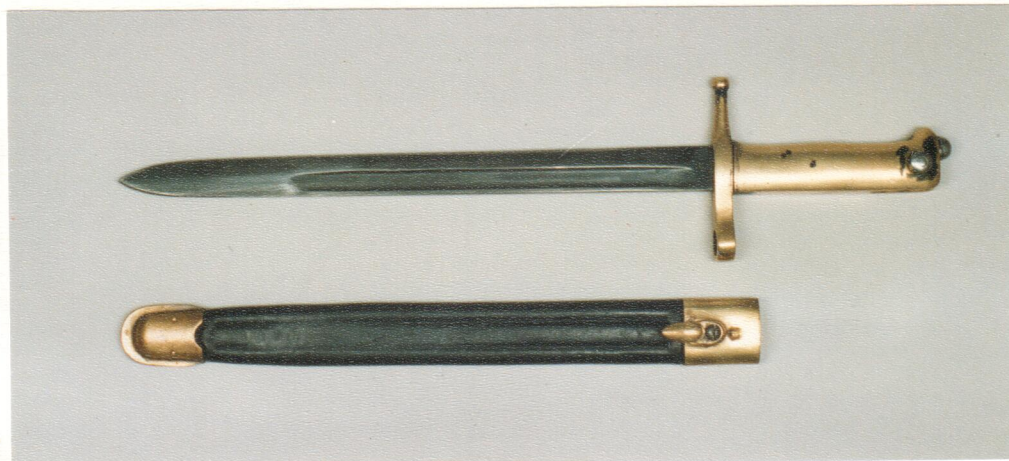

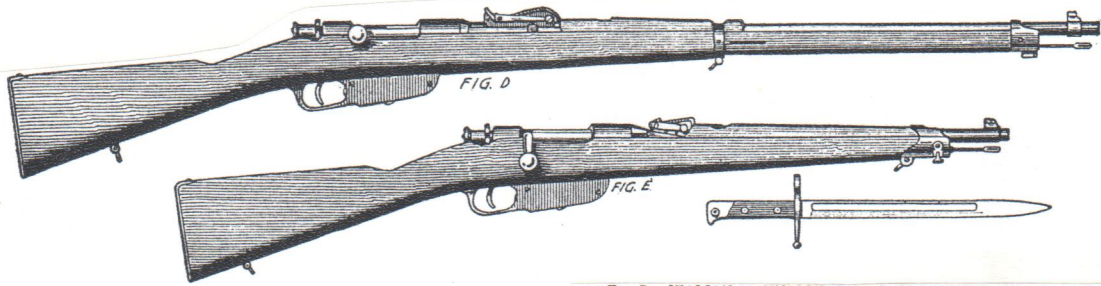


FIG. D. ITALIAN MANNLICHER MAGAZINE RIFLE. Model of 1891. Known officially as the "Carcano," named after an ordnance expert of Turin Arsenal, who introduced some features in the breech mechanism. The calibre is .256 or 6.5 m/m., the clip holding 6 cartridges. No improvements have been made on the arm since its introduction. The swinging arm of the rear sight folds over to the front to prevent it catching in the soldiers' clothes. The cleaning rod is full length and very thin and light. Bolt is the usual quarter turn to the left and back pattern. The rifle is distinguished for its few parts and lightness being but 8½ pounds in weight.

FIG. E. ITALIAN MANNLICHER MAGAZINE (CARCANO) CARBINE. Model of 1891. Practically the same as the rifle, but with an 18½-inch barrel. The bayonet however is different, as it is attached by a circular motion using the barrel as a pivot. Six shots, calibre .256 or 6.5 m/m. The original model of the Italian carbine had a spring bayonet, which was attached permanently to the muzzle of the gun, it folded back and was held in place by a groove in the band which was placed about 6 inches in front of the rear sight. None of this model, however, seem to have found their way to this country.
